A.Introduction.

▶ The testing of Jesus as the Son of God.

B.The Setting of the Temptations.

Like Israel, Jesus was led into the wilderness/desert to be tested.

1. First temptation:

Turn stones into bread.

Jesus quoted from Deuteronomy 8:2-3.

2. Second temptation: Jump off the Temple.

- ▶ The devil quoted Psalm 91:11 -12.
- ▶ Jesus quoted from Deuteronomy 6:16 (Incident in Exodus 17:7).

Explanation

 Jesus' faithfulness as the representative of God's people (the embodiment of Israel).

Jesus again quoted from Deuteronomy 6:13

C. The Outcome of the Temptations.

God feeds his Son in the same way that Israel was supernaturally fed in the wilderness (desert).

D. Closing:

▶ Matthew gave us this account to show 1) Do we see temptations as ways us about Jesus' faithfulness as the rightful representative of God's people (the embodiment of Israel).

Remember:

- 1. Jesus could die for our sins and offers us forgiveness and eternal life in him. 3) Are we going to use the 40 days
- 2. Jesus' righteousness is credited to us and our standing before God is depend on his righteousness.
